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Trustees Update 2021-22

As a trustee of the Foundation, I am pleased to present the Annual Report for the fiscal year 2021-22. This year has been a challenge for us as we navigated the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic and its impact on our operations and finances. Despite it, I am proud to report that our Foundation remains resilient and continues to make a positive impact on our communities.

A key highlight of this year was our ability to adapt to the changing needs, as we quickly shifted focus to providing essential services in health, skills and education. We were able to reach many more individuals and families in need, and secure additional funding to support these efforts.

Through our interventions in healthcare, skill development, education, livelihood and environment conservation, we have directly reached 4,39,000 people through 13 programmes implemented across 12 districts of Assam and West Bengal this year.

Looking forward, we will continue to adapt our responses to the changing needs of the population. We thank our staff, donors, and partners for their continued support and look forward to another successful year.

Healthcare

The operations of the Referral Hospital and Research Centre (RHRC) in Chubwa, which provides specialized medical facilities, consultations and treatments to the residents of the area, was transferred to APPL Foundation in February 2022. We are grateful to TCPL for their continued support in the operations of the Hospital, which addressed health concerns of approximately 1,90,000 people this year through In-patient and Outpatient Departments, surgeries and diagnostic tests.

Tuberculosis is a major health concern in North-East India. Contributing to The National Tuberculosis Elimination Programme (NTEP), we screened over 1,50,000 people for TB, of which 386 were diagnosed and treated. In the process, we also built capacities of our healthcare personnel and hospitals to serve as diagnosis and treatment centres for the larger community in and around

address fungal infections and menstrual hygiene related challenges among adolescent girls and women; nutritional challenges among children and pregnant or lactating women. Through community engagement such as street plays and awareness campaigns, out of a total of 17400 women and girls in Upper Assam and Dooars, the taboo around menstrual hygiene was reduced among 88% of them. The program also provided a source of income to women from the community who conducted door-to-door awareness and sold menstrual absorbents to them at affordable prices.

The Workforce Nutrition Programme, with a similar strategy, employed 6 educators from the community to increase awareness about nutritional cooking and food related practices. They received an incentive per sale of health and nutritional products, improving the health of over 1000 lactating and pregnant women.

Skills and Education

The Foundation continued their work on skills and education during the pandemic at the Vocational Training Centre (VTC) Chubwa and the Industrial Training Institute (APPITI) at Rowta, with special emphasis on women and adolescent girls. At APPITI, Rowta, the short and long-term vocational training courses saw 412 new enrolments in 2021-22, while maintaining a record of 75% placements, with an average starting income of Rs.10,000 per month in reputed textile companies.

In response to the rise in gender-based violence incidents reported across the country, women, adolescent girls and their guardians were also made aware of Women's Rights and the importance of ensuring Safety and Gender Equality, through awareness meetings and discussions.

The Foundation also publishes an e-journal, "Organic Growth" which highlights critical issues on environment degradation and innovations for a healthier and greener future.

Vision for Tomorrow

We are proud to share our vision for the coming years since the reduced impact of Covid-19 now allows us to build back stronger.

With focus on expanding our reach and impact, we will forge new partnerships with like-minded organizations and businesses, who also challenge us to innovate and


improve. We will also continue to invest in pioneering initiatives that address the most pressing needs of our communities.



Referral Hospital & Research Centre (RHRC), Chubwa

Referral Hospital & Research Centre, a 76-bed hospital with state-of-the-art medical facilities, was set up at Chubwa Tea Estate by Tata Tea Ltd. (Tata Consumer Products Ltd.) in 1994. The hospital works on a nonprofit basis and has been offering treatment at affordable cost to the public. On April 1, 2007, the hospital was transferred from Tata Tea to APPL and then again to APPL Foundation on February 21, 2021.

The hospital was built to provide secondary care medical facilities to nearby tea estate residents and the population in and around that area. RHRC has treated over 3,29,154 patients since its inception, including over 2,73,809 people from the community at large.

eHealthcare

eHealthcare is one of the ambitious projects of APPL Foundation, in association with Hewlett-Packard Enterprise (HPE) to promote telemedicine services in 5 Tea Estate hospitals in Assam and North Bengal. The project was started in 2015 at Dam Dim, Kellyden, Hathikuli, Namroop, and Powai Tea Estates. Currently, the eHubs offer consultations on medicine, surgery, gynaecology, eye, ENT, and lab test services.

Key Objects

- ◆ To deliver advanced medical services in remote locations
- ◆ To increase resources to make them accessible to the neighbouring rural population within a 10km radius
- ◆ To provide timely treatment to patients who are unable to travel for better medical consultation
- ◆ To establish a structure capable of responding quickly in the event of a widespread medical emergency.

TB Case Findings Programme

The TB Case Findings Programme has been initiated by the foundation, in collaboration with Hewlett Packard Enterprise (HPE), in Kellyden, Powai, Namroop and Hathikuli Tea Estates.


Tuberculosis has been a longstanding issue in the tea garden communities, mainly due to lack of sanitation practices and increased exposure to germs. APPL Foundation has pledged to support these communities in being TB free by aligning with The National Tuberculosis Elimination Programme (NTEP), which aims to strategically reduce TB burden in India by 2025.

The programme offers

- ◆ Screening of communities for TB across 4 estates
- ◆ Diagnosis of people showing TB symptoms and their subsequent testing
- Connecting diagnosed patients with the first line of treatment and monitoring their treatment
- Building capacity of tea garden hospitals to serve as TB identification/diagnosis centres for the community at large.











Fungal Free Frocks (3F) Project

The 3F Project is an initiative of APPL Foundation supported by Serra Foundation. The project aims to prevent and cure fungal infection through medical intervention. The project was piloted in 3 tea estate communities in North Bank of Assam in 2019 which has now expanded and spans over 13 communities. A reflection of the success of the project can be seen in the health and lifestyle change that the community has adopted.

The initiative has helped in breaking the silence around fungal infection.

Biroshmoni of Achabam is a worker in garden who not only understands the importance of the preventive measures against fungal infection, but also spreads these messages in her community. She also advised her friends to adopt similar hygiene practices. Ointments to those who needed treatment was administered by the doctor. She also encouraged her neighbouring households to avail the benefits of the 3F project, due to which, they were also treated and cured.







Menstrual Hygiene Management (MHM) Programme

APPL Foundation along with VJS Foundation, began their sensitization drive on menstruation hygiene in Dooars across 4 tea estates, Dam Dim, Nowera Nuddy, Rungamuttee and Batabari. The programme aims to normalise conversations on menstrual hygiene among adolescent girls and women. It has created an environment for the young girls to discuss freely about their menstrual problem and has provided opportunity to avail affordable menstrual hygiene products for women of all ages.

Project Swadhin

A new wing of ease and dignified menstrual days

Battling with the unhygienic practices and taboo related to menstruation among the tea community, APPL Foundation partnered with 'Aadya-zaroorihai' to implement Project 'SWADHIN' for Menstural Hygiene Management in the four tea estates of Assam: Borhat, Achabam, Nahorkutia, and Namroop. The project aims to fight the taboo related to menstruation in Assam, as menarche is celebrated as a rite of passage for young girls with pomp.







Workforce Nutrition Programme

Nutrition support to pregnant and lactating women for safe motherhood

APPL Foundation in partnership with the Global Alliance for Improved Nutrition (GAIN) and Dharma Life have implemented this programme in 6 Tea Estates namely; Achabam, Chubwa, Nahorkutia, Nahortoli, Namroop & Powai of Upper Assam. The objective of the programme is to address nutritional challenges in Tea Supply Chain through behaviour change campaigns and community engagement activities. The programme mainly reached out to pregnant and lactating women. Dharma Life Educator (DLEs) were selected from the community to run activities under the programme and to promote nutrition through sale of social cause-based products like food, solar lights, induction cooktop, sanitary napkins.

It's an entrepreneurial model where DLEs get incentive from sale, apart from their basic stipend.




Amalgamated Plantations Private Industrial Training Institute (APPITI), Rowta

Amalgamated Plantations Private Industrial Training Institute (APPITI) is a flagship facility of APPL Foundation that provides certified vocational training to youths. The institute was established in 1997 by Tata Tea Ltd. (Tata Consumer Products Ltd.) out of the need for skill-based courses for the youth from socio-economically disadvantaged backgrounds in order to generate technical manpower and employability. Since 2014, APPITI in partnership with Gram Tarang Employability Training Services (GTETS) has been training and creating employment opportunities for thousands of youth in the region.







Organic Growth Women Prosper

Assam and West Bengal, with its rich biodiversity, offers several solutions, indigenous to the region, for sustainable livelihoods. APPL Foundation works to engage the local population in development practices to improve their socioeconomic status while conserving the local ecology. The Foundation's work is driven by the overarching objective of SDG, which calls for the promotion of sustainable communities and responsible consumption and production.



Women Prosper Programme

Enhancing the overall prosperity of Hathikuli women

Women prosper is a multi-sectoral initiative of the Barefoot College International (BCI) in partnership with the Starbucks Foundation and SHRI Foundation for women of Hathikuli Tea Estate. The objective is to transform woman at Hathikuli into a skilled, self-confident woman, aware and vocal about her social, financial, and health rights.

Sustainable livelihood through environment friendly products

ENRICHE & Digital Training

50 women were trained as Solar engineers, Beekeepers and Community leaders under Enriche module.

Empowerment to the women of Hathikuli to be self-reliant and confident by training on alternative skills of income generation. 50 women became digitally literate which positively impacted their financial literacy. Now they are aware of online payment systems and can perform internet banking. The programme benefited 2728 women directly who are now aware of the Enriche training modules on soft skills.

Beekeeping

Our 21 beekeepers are a successful example of women empowerment and sustainable biodiversity conservation.

Hathikuli provides a suitable landscape for beekeeping as it is near the strategic location of Kaziranga National Park. It is a state-of-the-art women's entrepreneurial model which directly benefited 21 women of the Hathikuli area. Each woman was provided with 2 bee boxes with fresh bee colonies and other essential tools.

Solar Engineers


22 women were trained as Solar Engineers.

They were successfully trained on fabrication, repair, and maintenance of solar products. The solar Rural Electronic Workshop (REW) in Hathikuli was established to provide a space for solar engineers to manufacture their solar products.

Organic Growth

In contribution to global discussions around environment conservation, APPL Foundation publishes an e-journal, "Organic Growth" with over 400 readers in East and North-East India. It highlights issues of environment degradation and innovative technical and non-technical breakthroughs towards environment conservation for a healthier greener future. The latest issue of the journal in 2021 focuses on Food Security, discussing critical topics such as - overuse of natural resources, changing land use patterns and food insecurity affecting the socio-economically vulnerable communities.


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
